

Proposed Coalition Criteria

- Aligned with UNSG Call to Action "Areas of Convergence"
- · Help set the political tone for the Pre-Summit and Summit
- Systemic and transformative: Address core issues through a systemic lens; and tackle global landscape fragmentation by building a coherent, interconnected bigger picture aligned with overall UNSG narrative
- Grounded in the 2030 Agenda vision, targets, and approach (SDG17) including:
- Designed in support or and alignment to national development agendas, and championed by countries
- Multi-stakeholder: Bring people together who abide by the UNFSS Principles of Engagement; encourage immediate and long-term (institutional and individual) behaviour change, better coordination, collective ownership of long-term goals
- Reaffirmation of international solidarity: All countries in the same boat, irrespective of geographic location, economic performance or "level" of development;
- Strong (mutual) accountability dimension within coalitions, and as part of the UNFSS outcomes

FOOD IS A PUBLIC GOOD, HUMAN RIGHT & COMMONS: UNIVERSAL FOOD ACCESS & INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' FOOD SYSTEMS



- Several countries in African Union
- Japan, UAE likely to join
- Co-leads are reaching out to Korea, Turkey, UK, UAE, Netherlands, China, Sweden, USA
- USA, UK, EU expressed formal interest
- Sweden, Czech Republic likely to join
- Team is reaching out to Germany, Netherlands, France
- SC and AT5 co-leads are contacting fragile states, regional organisations and other countries in G7
- National Dialogues have already reported this topic as a prioritised one: Armenia, Georgia, Cameroon, Ireland, Nigeria, Turkey and Iraq.

- Spain, Kenya, Gambia, Norway, Canada, NZ expressed support to HR and indigenous FS

WHAT IS EXPECTED OF THE COALITION MEMBERS?

- Commitment to the coalition until 2030 and beyond
- Build coalitions with other countries in other regions
- Identify local priorities that reflect the objectives of the clusters and the thematic areas:
- Build coalitions with regional IFIs, local and regional private sector players
- Propose financing mechanisms that will support post summit implementation
- Propose national, regional and global actions and policy changes that are required to support Climate Resilient Development Pathways for Resilient Food Systems



APPROACH TO THE COALITIONS





PARTICIPATION

- Multi-stakeholder: National governments (either in donor or policy maker capacity), UN agencies, private sector representatives (incl. individual companies and SMEs), civil society representatives and representatives of Indigenous Peoples, producer groups, scientists, local governments, etc.
- Must abide with the <u>Vision</u> and <u>UNFSS Principles of</u> <u>Engagement</u> (updated to include Do No Harm) of the UNFSS.



EXPECTATIONS

- Align to the 2030 Agenda for **Sustainable Development:** alignment to country-owned and country-led development priorities; Placing needs of furthest behind first (communities, populations, countries, populations, regions); Abolish distinctions between North/South, aid provider/recipient; Partnering, collaboration and solidarity, peerto-peer around a common vision; Accountability with a strong emphasis on data, capabilities transferred to national actors and structures, and mutual accountability.
- Business as usual and incremental changes are <u>no longer an</u> <u>option</u>. All actors should join forces to be part of solutions that look at systems.

- Each partner is expected to make formal commitments.
- Commitments should be developed inclusively, in coherence with other actors, acknowledging the leadership of national governments, aligned to national agendas and objectives and SDG targets. The UNFSS Commitment guide will offer (optional) guidance to interested stakeholders to develop SMART commitments.
- Each Coalition is expected to provide an overview/ambition of the coalition, evidence/relevant SDG and other internationally agreed targets (+ Paris, Aichi targets, other), general direction of commitments expected, impact at scale, etc.



SUPPORT / VALUE ADD

• These <u>coalitions can offer countries:</u> knowledge, technical expertise, case studies, country specific technical assistance (incountry presence); peer-topeer learning, South-South and triangular cooperation; high-level advocacy and to sustain Summit momentum and translate into concrete actions; Support to resource mobilization.

ENGAGING FURTHER

- Aligning national priorities with AT5 solution clusters
- Supporting the thematic areas & building coalitions
- Developing the solutions further in AT5 template
- Elevating specific priorites produced through national dialogues or national development plans/ regional dialogues
- AT5 to continue engaging at all levels with MS to understand where the priorities sit and the potential commitments of MS
