Background

The provision of safe and sustainable sanitation is a development priority. Evidence produced by the Water Research Commission (WRC) and its partners have shown sustainable sanitation that is largely achieved through appropriate infrastructure, effective planning and management and good toilet behaviours. When one of these key elements is missing / lacking, it can be expected that infrastructure will deteriorate and possibly require repairs, refurbishment or replacement.

This webinar shares the lessons from research projects that aimed to provide solutions to servicing, operation and maintenance of toilet infrastructure with a focus on the containment and collection aspects of the sanitation value chain. There remains no single solution to poor sanitation with toilets being but one part of the sanitation solution chain. The lessons provided in this webinar aim to inform municipalities and other sanitation service providers of how they can improve their servicing, operation and maintenance and what are the key areas of concern or priority where greater efforts are required.

This webinar will focus on 3 different areas:

- What we need to improve pit emptying services and rural school sanitation?
- Communal ablution blocks key aspects which could improve the quality of services in informal settlements and reduce disease transmission
- Sanitation in the workplace
